Council Tables Ordinance

The Connell Town Council Wednesday evening tabled a controversial amendment to the electrical-equipment ordinance which would have forbidden the use of No. 14 wire and the use of staples for attaching electrical wiring.

Publications of the ordinance had been delayed pending the hearing Wednesday night.

In presenting the motion to table the ordinance, Councilman Henry Whitney reiterated his conviction that more stringent wiring regulations were advisable for public safety but felt the state would tighten the code shortly, thus eliminating the need for municipal action.

Ben Klindworth, one of numerous protestants, contended that for Connell to adopt regulations more stringent than those of the National Fire Underwriters would discourage builders from undertaking housing projects in the community. He cited that residential structures such as Farwest Builders are erecting here have been built in Moses Lake, Yakima, and other communities. Klindworth is Connell agent for Farwest.

Andrew Bjorn said he thought it inadvisable to require builders to alter construction procedures approved by the Federal Housing Administration and major lending concerns.

Whitney said the proposed amendment was not aimed at the Farwest project, but was inspired by two building fires.

Councilman Ted McKenney said he regarded No. 14 wire as too tight for safety in view of the tendency of families to plug in numerous appliances. He said the use of No. 12 would increase the average materials cost per home but \$5.

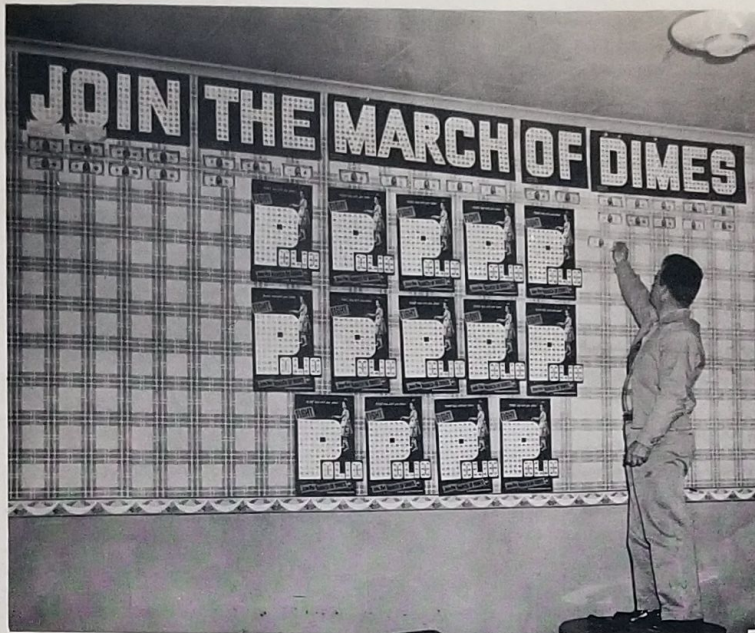
Sam Cahoon, electrician, said greater safety could be attained by the installation of more circuits rather than heavier wiring. Lyle Martin, electrical contractor, said that enactment of regulations more stringent than the code would create extra inspection expense. A state inspector now does the checking for compliance with the code.

Several argued the use of oversized or improper fuses presented a potential hazard rather than No. 14 wiring. Electricians said heavier wiring was installed for the utilities, and No. 14 primarily for lighting.

Mayor V. G. Sears suggested that representatives of the Connell Farmers Supply again present to Howard Bolen, building inspector, an application for a permit to install aqua ammonia storage facilities. Ray Colley and William German, co-owners, said Bolen had rejected the firm's application. The mayor told the men the decision on the application should be based on provisions of the zoning ordinance and that if they could not reach an agreement with Bolen their next recourse would be to appeal to the zoning board of equalization. A conference with Bolen was scheduled today.

Lyle Neff, of Agriform, said the liquid form was neither hazardous nor offensive but that he would not want to install storage facilities if to do so meant antagonizing the residents of Connell. He expressed a willingness to use portable facilities until such time as the people are satisfied the business does not

A truck driver for the Franklin County road department for 20 years, Patton was well known in North Franklin County.

He was stricken with a heart attack while attending a dance at Star Schoolhouse Saturday.

HIGHWAY COMMISSION SEEKS 103 MILLION

Franklin County would receive \$1,028,500 under provisions of appropriation requests submitted to the Legislature by the Washington State Highway Commission, which asked \$103,000,000 for highways, maintenance and administration in the next biennium.

In Adams County, \$507,000 for Highway 11, carrying traffic from Franklin County through Lind and Riverville, and \$393,000 for 7C, the East-West highway from Grant County line to Hatton, are two big projects.

Another major item is the \$250,000 allocated for 11G, in the vicinity of Othello.

The appropriation requests earmarks \$4,795,000 for the Columbia Basin counties of Franklin, Adams and Grant. Grant's is allowed \$2,592,800; Adams, \$1,178,000.

The Eagle Review, official publication of Connell High School, will move back to school journalism headquarters next week after a semester of publication as a part of the Graphic. After a fair trial, the journalism class decided it would prefer to publish the paper at school. We will miss the student page, and even more will miss the weekly call of the students who did much of the work in the Graphic office, but will follow with interest the mimeographed Review in its new phase. We have enjoyed our association with the Eagle staff and want the members to know that the Graphic stands ready to help at any time, in any way they desire.

The Graphic has been granted the status of a legal newspaper by Judge B. B. Horrigan of Franklin County Superior Court. Regular publication for a trial period of six months was the main requisite. The petition was presented by Robert W. Walker on behalf of the newspaper. The Graphic now is qualified to publish legal notices, the first of which appears in this week's issue, a city ordinance vacating a portion of an alley.

MEN AND WOMEN in overseas service may keep as well posted on domestic and international affairs as their folks at home, judging by from our son and daughter-in-law, Cpl. and Mrs. Gene Adams, who are in England.

The stray parts of Stars and Stripes were of particular interest. The S&S is a five-column tabloid like the Graphic, except that it is two or three times as fat and is published daily instead of weekly. The Nov. 10 issue, for example, had 24 pages.

The European Edition is published at Darmstadt, Germany. The directory lists 24 bureaus, at such points as London, Paris, Berlin, Bremen, Munich, Salzburg, Vienna etc.

The news of the world flows in the S&S editorial department through the facilities of at least three major wire services. Datelines show the Associated Press, United Press and International News Service. In addition, the S&S has its own news bureaus, judging by the other datelines which are labeled "Special" and "S&S."

The picture service also is comprehensive. Credit lines include AP, Keystone, INP, UP, Army and S&S.

The news is by no means all military. McCarthy's on the front page, just like in the U.S. press, and so are Joe and Marilyn.

The sports section has at least four pages, with detailed stories and pictures of the college and professional football game back home as well as sports in the armed services.

There are two pages of comic strips, crossword puzzle (solved before stuffing) and a flock of other features.

The S&S is unique in another way, too. Not a line of advertising.

The packing also included a sheet of the U.K. Edition of the American Daily, containing Page 1, 2 and 19, 20. The nameplate says the paper is the Army Navy and Air Force daily. Oh! Joe makes the front page of the American Daily, too. The paper apparently isn't as solidly subsidized as the Stars and Stripes. It carries advertising.

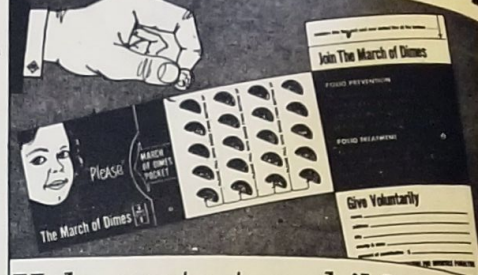

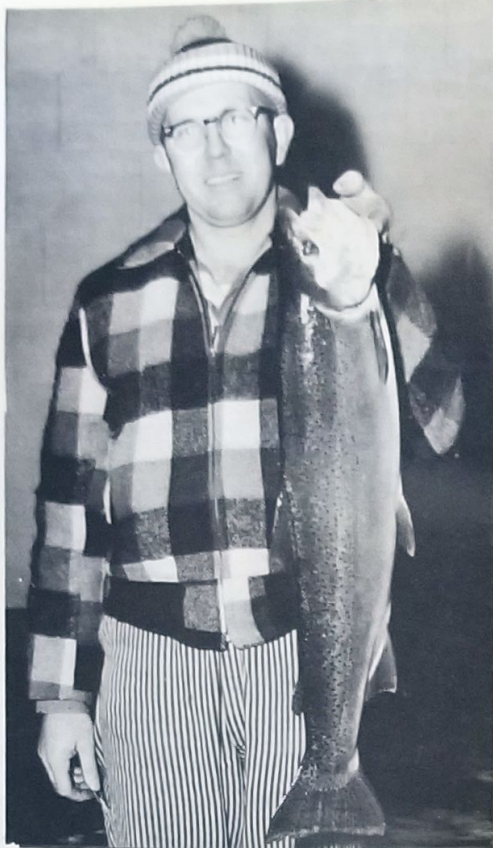
